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Lucille Hulbert, Founding Member, Shares Her Thoughts

Lucille started SWWS because the art society in Oregon was closed to Washington residents. Gayle Weisfield and Lucille met every two months in 1979 to develop SWWS. Mr. Weisfield, who was an attorney, set up the by-laws and did the work of getting SWWS incorporated with the State of Washington as a not-for-profit corporation in February, 1980. Twelve people were founding members of SWWS. They combined the annual meeting and awards banquet so folks who lived in outlying areas could attend both with one trip into town. They visited elementary schools, spoke to art classes, did mini watercolor classes, donated art supplies to schools, printed greeting cards of their artwork, and in general did local art promotion. Lucille went around to businesses in Vancouver and stimulated a lot of community participation. She got eight community leaders to serve as judges in the art show. For example, she got a woman from the garden society to pick the best floral in the art show. She solicited the business community for the funds to give cash awards to the winning artists. In 1980 they were able to use the porch of one of the houses on Officer's Row for an art show. It was a lot of work as they first had to clean off all the volcanic ash! They did not sell any paintings, but it stimulated a lot of interest. At first they just did four meetings per year. One was in December, as a Christmas party, and one was a summer picnic.

ON JURY-UP and QUALITY:

This is how they selected Active (Juried) members: Each member brought three paintings, then three of the original twelve members judged the

paintings, and those who were selected became the active members, and those who were not selected became the associate members.

“ I wanted SWWS to be about QUALITY, not politics . . . and PERSONAL FULFILLMENT to be the reason to become a juried member.”

Lucille had the following comments on jury up and the two tiers of the association: “I wanted SWWS to be about quality, not politics. I still feel that the reason for a person to become a juried member is personal fulfillment.” She was quite candid regarding keeping the prospectus with framing and matting requirements, “or else your art exhibit will look like bad hobby art.”

Lucille said that Barbara Van Nostern's work in bringing good quality art instruction to SWWS was one of the primary ways that SWWS became a quality, fine art organization.

ON INCREASING PARTICIPATION:

Here are Lucille's ideas on how to increase the level of member participation in SWWS:

“Do cash awards for the art shows. Get sponsors for the cash awards. Don't try to do something every month or you will burn out.

“Host a workshop or an event that you can invite artists to (art teachers and their students) who live in the outlying counties of the SWWS geographic area.”

ON A SCHOOL PROGRAM:

Teams of three people go to schools, do a class(es). Buy and furnish students with brushes (buy 25-30 Robert Simmons nylon brushes) since, while students have access to adequate paint, they do not have adequate brushes. Do it like an “Artist in Residence” program. Third graders are the best age. Draw with the brushes (do not introduce pencil for drawing). Do very simple drawings. Let the kids be creative. 🍷



SWWS “Four Questions” Results

If you were unable to attend the Annual Meeting, Sheila Martinson would still love to hear from you regarding these four questions. This also goes for anyone who attended but has more things to add. Email your ideas to Sheila at smartinson57@q.com. This feedback will be particularly helpful to the new board as they set their priorities for 2010.

1. In your opinion, what is the purpose of the SWWS? What should it be?

- A stage that gives artists opportunity, access to venues, education, networking, supportive environment, encouragement to artists, inspiration, interaction with other artists.
- Having potluck dinners.
- Educating the public about art.
- Going into elementary and middle schools, helping kids find talent.
- Encouragement and education.
- Supporting the arts.
- Encouraging excellence in watermedia.
- Meeting like-minded people.
- Promoting the arts within the community.
- Providing a place to show art.
- Chance to met other artists.
- Keeping art creativity alive.
- Being an art environment, nurturing.
- Forum for sharing ideas, knowledge.
- What we have now.
- Sharing art with the community through schools is iffy.
- Enrichment, growth.
- An avenue through which we can put our artwork on display.
- Providing support and education such as workshops, mentoring for artists.
- Meeting other artists in the local community.
- In our mission statement, it is unclear whether the term “community” means the artist community or the community at large.

2. How can the SWWS support your artistic growth? More workshops? More frequent critiques? Other ideas?

- Workshops: evening workshops for working people.
- Sponsor critique groups, choice of multiple locations, set up by neighborhoods.
- Shows: more ribbons or awards given to more paintings.
- Signature membership? Juried shows.
- More one-day workshops.
- Workshops should be after the show, not before.
- Have instruction available for new members on how to get ready for a show.
- AHA’s are great.
- Nationally known artist doing the workshops.
- SWWS artwork on the SWWS website.

- Bring information (workshops) from outside the local area.
- The artist has to be willing to give up part of a Saturday to take advantage of AHA’s.
- More critique groups . . . Nice to have a place to go for a critique group.
- Seems like we are doing a lot, especially AHA, perhaps Clark College serves that function?

3. Is selling your artwork important to you? How could the SWWS help you sell your paintings?

- Selling through the society is a bonus, not primary.
- Have descending entry fee for additional show entries.
- It is important to exhibit artwork.
- Have other show venues than the mall, i.e.: new library, Firstenberg Center, Hilton during an event such as wine and jazz festival.
- Lower SWWS commission, have show entry fee be \$10 for first painting, \$5 for second . . .
- Sort of, not the reason for joining.
- Have a “not for sale” option for artwork at SWWS shows.
- Member webpages on the SWWS website is a good idea, provides consistent format, charge each artist a fee, artist keeps updated. Particularly helpful to people timid about building their own website.

4. What are you willing and able to do to support the growth and continued existence of the SWWS?


- Volunteer for things . . . It is confusing as to where and when to volunteer.
- Put volunteer opportunities in the newsletter.
- Associate members get ribbons only. Gives them incentive to strive for juried membership.
- Pay dues.
- Do a frame co-op as framing costs are prohibitive.
- Non-juried members should be able to hold office.
- Hold an annual new-members welcome party with older members present to answer questions.
- Create calendars to sell at the fall show.
- Studio home tour.
- Phone tree, hot line, more personal contact
- Artists helping artists is a great thing and needs to continue.
- Enter shows.


